Some receive relatively small but crucial amounts that assist in program delivery while others receive more substantial amounts.\* This short summary impact report highlights the impact of some of these organizations and just a fraction of their valuable and essential work.

THE CITY OF WINNIPEG CURRENTLY SUPPORTS 39

Winnipeg's non-profit sector offers services such as lifesaving support to the city's most vulnerable residents, providing recreational programming and mentorship to marginalized youth, protecting the urban canopy and waterways and more. As frontline service providers, these organizations possess a deep understanding of the city's most pressing issues, such as poverty and public safety,

often making them the most effective at responding to these challenges as they have direct relationships with those most affected by them. Their efforts contribute significantly to other city provided services.

They also support the City in achieving many of its goals, including commitments made to the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action, the MMIWG2S+ Calls for Justice, the Winnipeg Poverty Reduction Strategy, the Newcomer Welcome and Inclusion Policy, Oshki Annishinabe Nigaaniwak - Indigenous Youth Strategy, Kikinaw Oma Strategy for housing, the Community Investment Roadmap, and those outlined in Our Winnipeg 2045 and the recent 2023-2026 Strategic Priorities Action Plan.

#### Winnipeg's Strategic Priorities Action Plan

The 2023-2026 Strategic Priorities Action Plan (SPAP) outlines City Council's key priorities and actions for their four-year term, guiding city planning, policy development, and decisionmaking. The community-based organizations featured in this report are helping the city of Winnipeg achieve many of these priorities, as this report will demonstrate.



## A&O: Support Services for Older Adults

A & O: Support Services for Older Adults is a nonprofit that takes action to improve the quality of life for older adults in Manitoba through advocacy, education and service delivery.

### Strategic Priorities:

A &O programs and services fall under three pillars: Safety & Security, Social Engagement and Counselling Services.



These programs, designed to empower and protect older adults, include Elder Abuse Prevention Services, Safe Suite Program, Safety Aid: Fall Preventions, and This Full House.

#### **Program Spotlight**

The Older Victim Services program collaborates with the Winnipeg Police Service to assist individuals over 60 who are victims of crime. Registered social workers offer emotional support and counselling, provide updates on the investigation, help with compensation applications, prepare impact statements, and accompany clients to court.

Impact Statistics: 840 hours provided to 219 clients.\*

#### Partnership Spotlight

Older adults in Winnipeg in need of food security assistance can call 311 to be connected with resources available through A & O, including assistance securing a food hamper, options for grocery delivery etc.

#### **Social Engagement**

These programs enable older Manitobans to remain independent and engaged in their community. This includes Senior Centre Without Walls (SCWW)—a program to reduce social isolation—Connect Program, and Senior Immigrant Settlement Services (SISS).



#### Clean Machine Program

This program employs youth during summer months to clean and remove debris from Winnipeg streets, parks, and waterways, including the Seine River and Omand's Creek. They also perform tasks to maintain green spaces, including weeding, planting, and watering.



Youth in the program perform important work in the community while gaining experience for future employment. In 2023, over 72% of the youth hired were employed for the first time.








#### Helping Kids Thrive

Just TV provides youth with opportunities to express themselves through multimedia in a safe, fun and creative environment. Participants engage in all facets of the audio and video industry and are tasked to create projects based on their interests, experiences and lives. An annual showcase is held at the end of the each term for families and friends to enjoy.

One of the most accredited and successful programs of The Broadway Neighbourhood Centre, Just TV has now claimed over a decade of progress, constantly providing youth with multitudes of opportunities from employment and resourcing to video and music production skills.

#### **Social Enterprise**

As part of its social enterprise activities, participants have produced dozens of high-quality videos and multi-media projects for diverse clients, including the City of Winnipeg. Examples include Anti-Racism Week (2017) and Building Bridges (2023).

#### **Education & Employment (2023/2024)**

Ten participants from this past year have or will continue to further their education. Many participants also gain internship, performance and employment opportunities through this program and go on to work in the industry.

#### **Testimonial**

#### **Compost Program**



For over 25 years, GAC's compost program has educated and empowered the public, schools, businesses, and organizations on composting and waste reduction, empowering them to implement these climate actions. This has included training Master Composter volunteers, providing educational resources, organizing public outreach campaigns, and helping develop new compost programs across the city through providing education and resources.



For example, last year GAC provided compost bins and language-appropriate composting workshops and resources tailored to newcomers. With the City's plan to implement a city-wide curb side composting program, educating the public will be key to its success.





# Manitoba Theatre for Young People

Manitoba Theatre for Young People is a renowned performing arts space and children's theatre company located at the Forks. It also runs a thriving year-round theatre school and diverse outreach programming.

**MTYP School** is one of the largest recreational theatre education centres in Canada for children and youth, serving over 1,500 participants yearly. The school offers a comprehensive financial aid and bursary program to support access for all interested young Winnipeggers.



Additionally, the school provides workshops, residencies and satellite programs through its Drama Outreach programming to schools, daycares, and community programs and agencies across the city.



Native Youth Theatre - This Indigenousled and delivered, free after-school program provides Indigenous and Métis children and youth with theatre, drama, film and media classes, that activates their creativity and imagination.



Original Productions - In addition to presenting guest companies at its venue, MTYP also produces original productions. At least one production each season is also toured, delivering performances at schools across the City of Winnipeg, and throughout rural and Northern Manitoba.





A Shared Performance Venue - MTYP's venue is used by many other organizations including the International Children's Festival, Winnipeg International Writers' Festival and the Winnipeg Fringe Festival, in addition to numerous schools, community groups, and other non-profits.

### **Mediation Services**




Mediation Services provide comprehensive conflict resolution support and coaching to families, neighbours and workplaces looking for outside help to manage conflict peacefully and respectfully.



### Free Conflict Coaching & Mediation Services



Mediation allows neighbours in conflict with each other to discuss their concerns in a neutral and safe environment where they can be heard, and work towards an agreement that works for both of them.



Neighbourhood conflict encompasses a variety of issues that may not be addressed by municipal bylaws or the Criminal Code. Some examples of this are property line issues, trees, offensive behaviours, and snow clearing.

311 operators, police, and by-law officers refer these individuals daily to Mediation Services. Thanks to support from the community grants program, a part-time intake worker answers between 250 - 350 community-related calls annually. Many of the claims supported through Mediation Services result in mediated or conciliated agreements that bring peace to the community and strengthen well-being.

Resource Assistance for Youth provides a wide variety of wrap-around, low-barrier services for youth in need. This includes housing, employment, basic needs, and mental health support.

#### **Street Outreach Program**

RAY's Street Outreach program provides mobile services and support to people experiencing houselessness. This includes handing out food and water, warm clothing, naloxone kits, harm reduction supplies, and resources and referrals. A nurse practitioner also joins outreach shifts to provide essential medical care to those with limited health care access.

#### **Housing Success**

In 2023/2024, the outreach team successfully housed some of their participants through partnerships obtained by the organization. Many of those participants have continued to exceed their own goals.

The team recently heard from one housed outreach participant who said that he has continued to stay in his place successfully and has been able to work on his other goals now that he has achieved housing.

#### **Programming**

Programming at Rossbrook House is shaped by the youth themselves and continuously evolves as new ideas and desires arise. Offerings include sports and recreational activities, a music program, Indigenous cultural activities, leadership

training, a young mom's program, safe rides home, and a healthy kitchen program.

With support from the Community Grants program, Rossbrook House is able to provide drop-in services to youth 365 days and 24 hours/day when school is not in session.

#### **Off-Campus Classrooms**

In partnership with the Winnipeg School Division, Rossbrook House hosts three off-campus programs for students who thrive in smaller learning environments. Based on the Manitoba Curriculum, lessons integrate Indigenous

Save Our Seine is a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving, protecting and restoring the Seine River greenway. This is achieved through enhancing public education and awareness, improving public access, and collaborating with the governmental, business and non-profit organization to ensure effective stewardship of the greenway.

Thanks in part to the support from the City of Winnipeg, Save our Seine has been able to help fund an Executive Director position and cover other essential operating expenses, enabling the organization to undertake crucial initiatives, including but not limited to:



#### **Urban Restoration and Enhancement Initiative**

This two-year initiative aims to restore, preserve and enhance the ecology and biodiversity of the Urban Seine River and its Greenway. In 2023, this included beginning to draft and

create two outdoor educational sites; continuing the Landcare program that engages local communities in the preservation and restoration of natural habitats; and adding Seine River Corridor Interpretive Signs, among other related activities.



#### **Summer Team Program**

A long-standing program of SOS, the summer team program has made significant inroads in transforming the health of the Seine River and its greenway. Every year, the program hires a team of youth to help care for

the greenway by removing waste and other debris from the river and surrounding area, upkeeping City of Winnipeg infrastructure like trails and monitoring for invasive species.

#### **Recreational Programming**

**Building Belonging** offers free after school programming for children ages 6 to 17. Children are picked up from John M King and Sister MacNamara schools and are given a meal and structured activities. Transportation home, either by walk or ride, is also available.

Newcomer Youth/Youth Drop-in Program runs free evening activities for youth ages 12 to 17. Youth are engaged in sports activities, arts and cultural programming, and mental health support activities.


#### **Connecting Community**

## **Trees Winnipeg**

Strategic Priorities:



Established in 1992, Trees Winnipeg (formerly Coalition to Save the Elms) is a non-profit charitable organization dedicated to protecting, preserving, and replenishing Winnipeg's urban forest and overall environment.







Trees Winnipeg's main programming consists of a twice-annual **ReLeaf Tree Sale Program** that allows Winnipeggers to purchase discounted trees for their properties. The trees are chosen by an ISA Certified Arborist, purchased from local tree farms, and customers are provided with detailed information on proper tree planting and tree care techniques.



#### **Main Activities**

For the past 24 years, the organization has hosted Winnipeg's annual **Arbor Day Festival** in a city park. The family-friendly event promotes tree planting and educates the public about Winnipeg's urban canopy and the threats facing it.



The Inner-city School
Tree Planting Program is
a new initiative that adds

new trees to provide shade to inner-city schoolyards that have been hardest hit by the loss of the city's elm tree population.



Other programming includes coordinating tree planting events for community organizations, leading tree identification walks in local parks, and hosting community-based tree care workshops for homeowners.
